Last month we highlighted language and literature (English language arts) and math, this month we will focus on Individuals and societies (social studies) and sciences. In year one (6th grade) history students are learning about early American Indians, in year two (7th grade) history we learn about the expanding nation and sense of citizenship. In year three (8th grade) we learn about physical and cultural geography.

In sciences, in year one our students are learning about astronomy, in year two we learn about scientific inquiry and in year three we learn about measuring matter and starting the Science Fair day.


MYP Classrooms & Authentic Assessments
