## Written Curriculum

Math Year 1 - 6th grade Pre-Algebra and Math Year 2 - Math 7 are moving mathematics into the real world. Pre-Algebra classes had to create a budget to make a major purchase. Given a random summer job, students had to complete a cost analysis consumer product they want



to buy and a plan to purchase it. In Math 7, students completed a unit on International Foods. Students had to apply proportions to transform a home recipe for 4-5 people into a recipe for a whole class of 20-25 students. On December 12, students brought a myriad of international foods to math class ranging from Ethiopian injera to El Salvadorian pupusas.

### MYP Classrooms & Authentic Assessments

Individuals and Societies - World Geography classes are taking a deep dive into an inquiry, debatable question: Is chocolate produced in the Ivory Coast of west Africa a good thing? Students are writing a



Document Based Question (DBQ) essay on the topic. Students are put into different group levels to do their work. They are using an online tool that compels students to organize their information to make an argument into three buckets. It is assessed using the IB Criterion C - Communicating rubric. ### Jefferson in the Community

Jefferson 7th graders are taking a staggered field trip to Arlington's great Outdoor Lab. This is a 200 acre woodland in Fauguier County owned by APS. Our students get a short briefing on ecology and human impact on the environment. Then they go into the woods to act as a young scientist. They work
