Written Curriculum

Language and literature (ELA) classes are beginning the new year with much nonfiction reading and writing. In MYP Yr 1, ELA, students have been completing a unit on persuasive writing. Specifically, students learned how to write persuasive essays--how to develop a claim about a character's traits in selected short stories and using evidence from those stories to support their claim. In Reading 6, students are reading various nonfiction texts to explore relevant concepts, including innovation, controversy, natural phenomenon, and persistence. They have also been learning about author's purpose, bias, and organizational patterns.


Community Project Proposals for Action
