#### Assessment Policy: Essential Agreements



The IB has four required policies: 1)
Academic Honesty, 2) Language, 3) Inclusion, and 4) Assessment. The first three have all been reviewed and updated this year. Now it's time to begin tackling the assessment policy. The Middle Years Program requires

that grading becomes a **fair**, **consistent** and **transparent** process. This means that grades must be based on specific subject criteria, rather than amorphous categories of homework, projects, quizzes and tests. Furthermore, assessment should give students feedback on the learning process, though not penalize them while they are learning new concepts and content. #### **Written Curriculum**

In Individuals and societies, our World Geography students are completing a problem based learning IB unit on conflict and resolution. Students collaboratively analyze a current global conflict around the world and propose a solution. They followed inquiries into the themes that define conflicts and why conflicts happen. After completing their investigations, our Geography students poured into the hallways to propose detailed solutions in the form of a podcast to some of the world's most intractable conflicts, (Afghanistan, North Korea, etc). Our students are imagining a better world one conflict at a time.

#### MYP Classrooms & Authentic Assessments

Individuals and societies and Language and literatures classes hosted a Civics Town-hall on February 4. County Board Members Christian Dorsey and Erik Gutshall and School Board Members Tannia Talento and Monique O'Grady joined the entire

## Developing an Action Plan

The IB action plan is an essential tool for ongoing school improvement. At Jefferson, we developed our last Action Plan four years ago after our last IB Evaluation visit. We are focusing on the five areas of recommendations: 1) Community Project awareness, 2) Planning the use and implementation of Approaches to Learning skills, 3) Strengthen the MYP Planning Process, in use of all six Global Contexts, 4) Unit plans and subject overviews must include key concepts, 5) Service learning should be aligned with concepts service outcomes. 6) Global issues connected to unit planners 7) Global contexts for Inquiry 8) Consistently using MYP assessment criteria.
