

- attribute sources, acknowledging the work and ideas of others
- use information technology and social media responsibly.

DRAFT Assessment Policy



After more than a year of meetings, professional development sessions, and three drafts our assessment policy is almost finished. Almost. We are still making revisions. We are open to feedback from the entire community. Email Mr. Malinosky with any ideas. This policy includes the purpose and principles of MYP assessment. Grades

are determined by the mean of final achievement scores (1-8) in all four criteria for each subject area. The scores within each criterion are not averaged, but use the mode or latest score.
