
The School Action Plan's IB Focus



This year we are putting a new emphasis on **Internal** standardization. This means at least

once a quarter, teachers will grade samples of student assignments together for greater consistency and fairness. Teachers do this by selecting samples of student work. They use a rubric with clear descriptors of different levels of achievement. Then starting at the bottom, they work to find consensus on the most accurate description of the student's performance. This way teachers arrive at greater clarity on the grading process.

An IB Policy explained: Language



Our updated TJ Language policy includes the latest language profile of our students. The top five languages are 1) English, 2) Spanish, 3) Amharic, 4) Arabic, and 5) Mongolian. There is no question that TJMS is a multilingual school as a fact, right and

This quarter our staff development for gifted services is on thinking routines from Harvard's Project Zero. Staff can opt in to this training as part of their planning and complete a five hour implementation cycle with Megan Detweiler, the RTG. Thinking routines are part of making thinking visible in the classroom and allow students to take ownership of their learning, especially with formative assignments and assessments. Anything formative is not counted towards a final grade, but it is critical to make sure these learning activities are rigorous and student-led.
